Haiti: Hurricane Matthew Emergency Response Project Report

Date: 4th November 2016, Time: 20:00 (Eastern Daylight Time)

Overview

On 4th October 2016, Hurricane Matthew struck the Republic of Haiti, leaving a trail of destruction across the island nation.

The hurricane brought about the country's most severe humanitarian crisis since the 2010 earthquake, causing loss of life, extensive flooding and mudslides, damage to critical infrastructure, and devastation to agriculture and other sources of livelihood.

According to the UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (UNOCHA), over 2.1 million people have been affected, of which 1.4 million require urgent humanitarian assistance, and there have been more than 3,700 suspected cases of cholera (as of 2nd November).

The government of Haiti has confirmed 546 fatalities, 132 missing, and 438 injured in the wake of the hurricane (as of 2nd November).

Peace Boat Disaster Relief Volunteer Center (PBV) in Haiti

PBV began gathering information and contacting local partners immediately after the hurricane struck the Caribbean region in the first week of October 2016.

A fundraising campaign was launched in the following weeks, onboard Peace Boat's passenger ship, in New York City at the "Floating Festival for Sustainability" event on 20th October, in Japan, and online.

During the week of 17th October, a formal partnership for Hurricane Matthew Emergency Response was established with New York-based nonprofit, World Cares Center, with whom PBV partnered to respond to Hurricane Sandy in the USA in 2012/2013.

Emergency Response Operations

A PBV staff member departed for the Haitian capital Port-au-Prince with Lisa Orloff, Founder and Executive Director of World Cares Center, arriving in the morning of 29th October.

After liaising with local staff and preparing emergency supplies, PBV and World Cares Center departed for Jeremie, approximately 280km drive away. The town of Jeremie, with a population of 31,000, was one of the areas most affected by Hurricane Matthew.

Between 29th October and 1st November, PBV and World Cares Center delivered much-needed assistance to the communities in and around Jeremie (see the "Impacts" section below).

World Cares Center (which has extensive experience in Haiti since the 2010 earthquake) had already identified a reliable coordinator in Jeremie who was able to gather beneficiaries, communicate with stakeholders, and provide local knowledge which proved to be a major asset.

The joint team took all necessary precautions to ensure their safety as they moved around the affected areas, and ensured not to be a burden on affected communities by being self-sufficient and well prepared.



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Impacts

PBV and World Cares Center successfully delivered the following services:

TRAINING & CAPACITY BUILDING

Delivered a training session to 80 community leaders representing 12 communes in the Jeremie area. The training focused on disaster management and community health and sanitation (including cholera prevention).

> DISTRIBUTION OF PERSONAL PROTECTIVE EQUIPMNENT (PPE)

Delivered 80 Personal Protective Equipment kits to community leaders who attended the training session above. The PPE kits included gloves, goggles, and respiratory masks, enabling them to help their communities in a safe and effective way.

> DISTRIBUTION OF HYGIENE KITS

Delivered 400 hygiene kits in the commune of Rouseaux. The hygiene kits included soap, toothbrush, toothpaste, shampoo, towel, mosquito repellent, and other essential items.

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Future Prospects

There is a strong case for sustaining a longer term project in Haiti. With a rise in post-disaster health

and sanitation challenges (e.g. cholera), the need for strengthening communities' abilities to cope

with these hazards is as urgent as ever.

Whilst many aid agencies continue to provide supplies (food, water, etc.), PBV believes it can make

a major impact through capacity building of communities with training and education. The workshop

implemented during this first deployment with World Cares Center is a prime example of this kind of

initiative

Having conducted the workshop in Jeremie, there were several community leaders who wanted to

bring this information to their respective communities, and it was clear from the participants' feedback

that it provided significant value.

PBV and partners hope to continue projects in Haiti, dependent on availability of resources.
